Prefixes are a group of letters added to the front of a root word which change the meaning of a word. Most prefixes mean a similar thing when they are added to different words.

un usually means not or the opposite of.


For example when the prefix 'un-'comes before to the root word 'fair' it results in the word 'unfair', meaning 'not+fair'.


Other examples include: happy/ unhappy, locked/ unlocked, kind/ unkind




