Read the text and answer the questions.

Generate story ideas based on a storm




- 1) Read the text again. Draw a picture that shows the setting and the people involved. Don't forget to show the emotion of the people.


Geometry - properties of shapes - symmetric figures


1) Colour the squares to make the patterns symmetrical







2) Complete the shapes according to the line of symmetry







3) Reflect the shape in the mirror line




Extension reasoning and problem solving -
