Maths Task (Multiplication and Division):

Make equal groups -

We can now recognise whether a group is equal or not. Today's learning focuses on making equal groups. We need to remember and use our learning from yesterday to help us. If a group is <u>equal</u>, there are the <u>same</u> amount in each group.

We can use our stem sentences from yesterday to help us.


Example 1:

Sometimes questions can try to trick us so we have to make sure we are reading the questions carefully. For example;





Only one of these statements is correct even though they use the same numbers.


Statement B is correct because there are 2 equal groups. Within each group there are 3 items.

A - 3 equal groups of 2 in each group B - 2 equal groups of 3 in each group

Remember our key word is equal which means the same!

There are 5 equal groups with 3 in each group.


There are two equal groups with five in each group.

Five twos.






Reading Task (Retrieval):

- 6. What does the author suggest you can do to stay safe 'just in case'?


Writing/ SPAG Task:

Non-Chronological Reports -

Recap: we write non-chronological reports to give people information about a particular subject. Some examples include: a non-fiction book, an information leaflet, a fact sheet or a fact file etc.

We need to plan and organise our ideas before we write our non-chronological report using information you research or collect. It is important to organise the subject area using subheadings so that it is easier for the reader to follow.

We are going to answer the questions below when we do our research.



Task: Use a spider diagram similar to the one below to record your research on an animal of your choice. Use a different spider diagram to answer each question. You may like to choose an owl because we have just read the story about one.
