
Maths Task (Multiplication and Division):

Multiplication sentences from pictures-

We can use the 'X' symbol to work out multiplication questions. 'Multiplied by' means the same as 'lots of' which is what we have been looking at the last few days.

How many equal groups X number in each group = We can still add them all up to help us work out the answer if we need to or we can add on the same number each time.

Example:



6 is how many groups there are._2_ is how many are in each group.




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

Non-Chronological Reports - Possessive Apostrophes


An apostrophe is the same shape as a comma but placed above the line. We can use apostrophes to show that one thing belongs to someone or something. We call this **possession**.

When we are talking about one thing, we call this **singular**. For example, a man or a bike.


When we need to say that something belongs to something singular, we put an apostrophe and then an 's' at the end of the name it belongs to. e.g. the man's bike.

We also use an apostrophe and an 's' to show when something belongs to a proper noun (a name that begins with a capital letter). e.g. India's national flag has three horizontal stripes on it.
