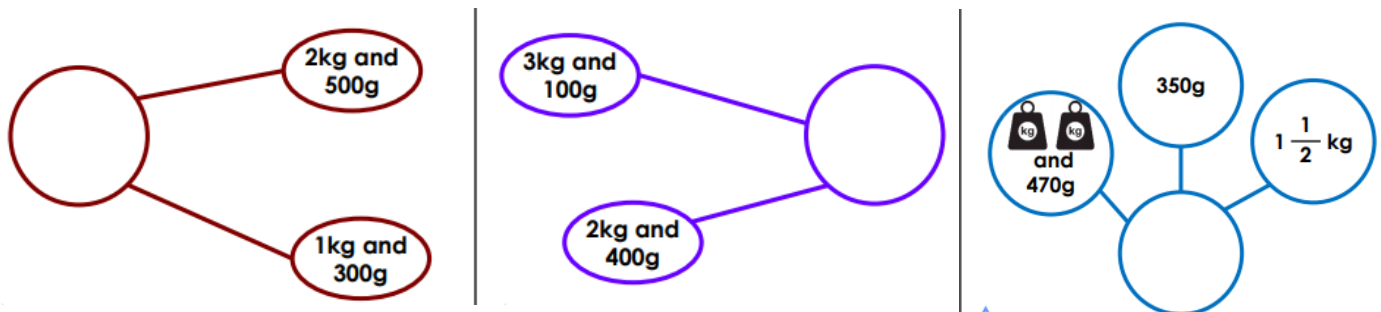

2) Complete the bar models.

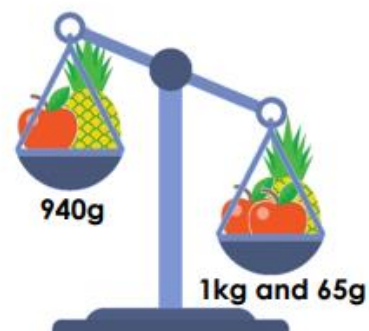

Task: Can you write your own poem about what you could find in a giant's pocket?

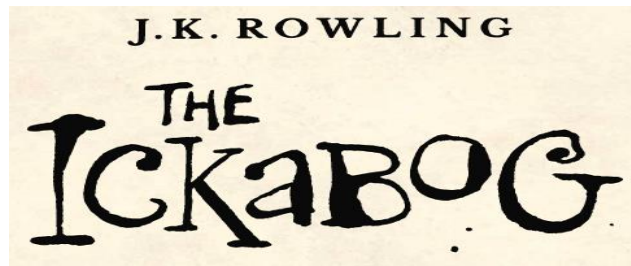
Use the format of 'Ten Things Found in a Wizard's Pocket' and your ideas from yesterday to help you with the structure.
