Capital Letter

Begin what is spoken with a capital letter!

Quotation Marks

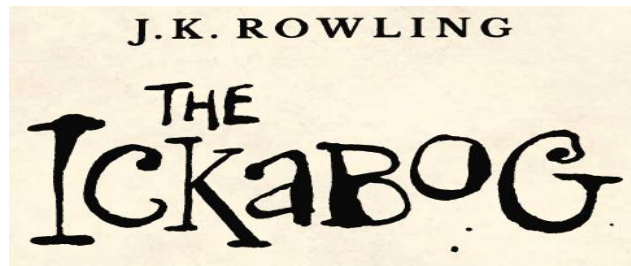
Commas
