Physical development

Use pens, crayons, paints, chalks etc to practise forming the letters in your name.

Get ready for sports day! In the garden or at the park practise running, jumping and hopping. Try balancing a potato on a spoon - be careful not to drop it!



Personal, social, emotional development

Play a game that involves taking turns.



Ask your child to tell you about our Golden Rules and why they are important.

Give your child a "job" to do eg tidying up toys, hanging up coat. Can they do it independently?

Literacy

When sharing a story with your child ask them to identify the characters in the story. Can they answer "Why" questions about the characters? Eg Why did Jack steal the Giant's gold?



Maths

Look out for numbers when you are out and about. Can you recognise any of the numbers on car number plates, on price labels, on road signs?



Communication and language

Can you use language to talk about opposites? Give your child a word eg hot and ask them to say the word that means the opposite



Expressive arts and design

We have read several stories that have castle settings. Encourage your child to use whatever resources they have at home to draw or build a castle. For example, they could use recycled boxes, Lego, sand, play dough or even a clothes airer to create a castle. If they prefer, they could use pens, pencils, crayons, chalk or paint to draw their castle.



Understanding the world

What happens when we plant a seed?
Can we do anything to help the seed?
How does the seed change?



Try planting the seeds/pips from fruit you have eaten

These activities should not take long to complete - it is better to spend a few minutes on an activity and then return to it at another time rather than expecting your child to focus for a long time.
