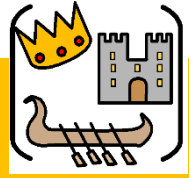

Power:

Why might history remember Queen Elizabeth II?

Celebrated for her dedicated public service. In a reign stretching over 70 years, she provided leadership, continuity and a focus for national unity.

Extremely popular for nearly all of her long reign, the queen was known for taking a serious interest in government and made the royal family more up-to-date.

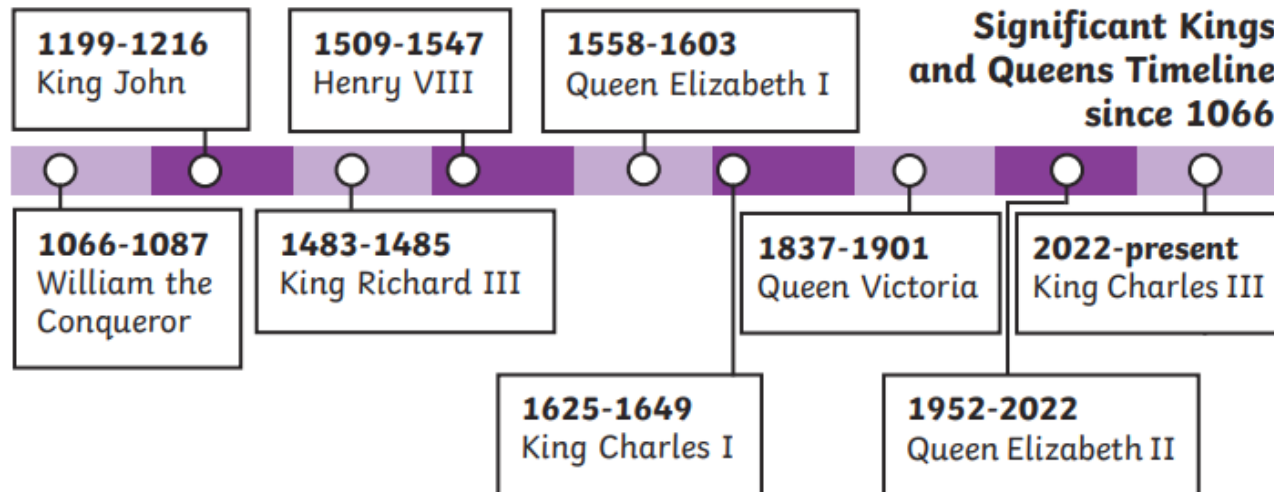
Queen Elizabeth I

Elizabeth II (Elizabeth Alexandra Mary; 21 April 1926 – 8 September 2022) was Queen of the United Kingdom and other Commonwealth realms from 6 February 1952 until her death in 2022. She was queen regnant of 32 sovereign states during her lifetime and was head of state of 15 realms at the time of her death.

William I ruled England from 1066 until his death in 1087. He overthrew the last Anglo-Saxon king, Harold II, to seize the throne, earning the title William the Conqueror.

Queen Victoria is associated with Britain's great age of industrial expansion, economic progress and, especially, empire. At her death, it was said, Britain had a worldwide empire on which the sun never set. Victoria was born at Kensington Palace, London, on 24 May 1819.

She was responsible for English exploration of the New World and the flourishing of the economy, making England a world power. Her reign was also noted for the English Renaissance, an outpouring of poetry and drama. Elizabeth's court also became a center for poets, musicians, writers, and scholars.
